## Contemporary Non-Western Art Art 244 Fall 2012

A perspective on contemporary Non-Western art:

- 1. Art around the world has common characteristics:
  - a. Art in any culture changes over time because of internal developments and outside influences
  - b. Those changes can be slow or fast, voluntary or imposed
- 2. The history of Western influences on Non-Western cultures
  - a. Began with Alexander the Great's travels through the Middle East to India
  - b. Continued with trade along the Silk Road (which also influenced Western cultures)
  - c. Accelerated with Portuguese and Spanish exploration of the 1400s
  - d. Had greatest impact with colonial rule beginning in the 1700s.

Three approaches to Non-Western art in the 20<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup> centuries

- 1. Post-colonialism emerges when cultures regain home rule:
  - a. Recognizes the legitimacy of their culture's ancient traditions
  - b. Some artists revive and preserve traditional forms of cultural expression including visual and performing arts
  - c. Some artists synthesize, combining new forms from the West with traditional art forms of their ancestors
- 2. Post-modernism "decolonizes" art,
  - a. Takes a world view that embraces variety, discontinuity, disjunction and flux.
  - b. Questions the meaning of "originality" and "creativity" and the idea the Western art is "fine art" while other cultures have "crafts."
- 3. <u>Internationalism</u> began with Van Gogh and Picasso and now continues with artists from China, Africa, Japan, etc.
  - a. Rejects the idea of Non-Western art as "primitive" or "tribal."
  - b. Rejects the idea of Western art as pollution of the "purity" of Non-Western art and its religious foundations.
  - c. Accepts a dialogue between the past and the present in the spirit of pre-contact works that recognize the need to balance the past and the present, tradition and innovation.
  - d. Aims to look at art without a Western or Non-Western perspective.
  - e. Its goal is to draw strength and inspiration from any and every source of ideas and forms artists find around the world.
